Ferry Information

The Washington State Ferry system serves the Anacortes to Sidney BC run, and has two departures during the summer months. It is best to go on-line and get a current schedule for the season. Although roll-on kayakers and walk-on passengers have little problem finding room in the busy summer months, vehicles are a different story. Be sure to plan ahead.

Chart, Currents, Weather

The NOAA chart 18421 titled "Strait of Juan De Fuca to Strait of Georgia" covers the entire San Juan Island group as well as a portion of the Canadian Gulf Islands. The scale is 1:80,000 and is acceptable for kayak navigation in all but the worst of weather.

The Biological Sciences of the University of South Carolina has a great web page for current prediction for the San Juan's, and for a great part of the world. You may want to add this to your "favorites" group for any future paddle destination.

A good weather radio, preferably one with VHF transmit capability is a must for multi day paddles anywhere in the Pacific Northwest waters.

Camping Permits

Camping sites in the San Juan Islands is limited, so plan ahead. The Washington Water Trails Association has a series of human powered vessels only camp sites, but they can be busy during the peak summer months. Be sure to arrive early, and expect company.

Just because you enter Canada by kayak, do not think that you are exempt from report to customs. At the entrance of the Sidney harbor you will see the customs dock. Be sure to have your passport and take the few minutes to call in your arrival on the dedicated phone for this purpose. You will be issued an arrival number, and may be asked for it upon your return to the US.
